March 21 **SATURDAY** 1 to 3 PM

CRIMES OF THE FIFTH AVENUE GOLD COAST

Fraud, procuring, and murders most foul—all on the New York avenue of wealth and privilege.

MEET: The Frick Collection, 1 E 70th St., between Fifth/Madison Aves.

March 29 SUNDAY 1 to 3 PM **JEWISH COLONIAL MANHATTAN**

April 11 SATURDAY 1 to 3 PM THE CIVIL WAR IN MANHATTAN

During the Civil War, escalating ethnic and class tensions culminated in the draft riots, which tore the city apart. NYC played a crucial role in winning the war, which ended in April 1865.
